Jesus and the Israelites (Christ's Death brings life– Chapters 3 and 4 of the Book)

Lesson Preparation:

Read in advance chapters 3 and 4: "Which Way Back to the Promised Land?" and "The King Who Will Reign Forever". The group should also read these chapters. Four scraps of red paper and tape will be needed for the lesson.

1. Hook:

Begin with a prayer. Then say, "There are brave people in our community who are willing to risk their lives to save others. Ask: What are some professions that risk their lives to save others? (Possible answers: firefighters, doctors, lifeguards, soldiers, just heroes, etc.) These are ordinary people who risk their lives and sometimes even lose their lives to save someone. Ask, "Do you know any stories about people like that?" Have the group briefly share such stories. Jesus is the ultimate example of one who died for others. He died to save the whole world from God's punishment for sin.

2. Book:

In last week's talk we looked at four pictures of Jesus Christ in Genesis, the first book of the Bible. 1. Jesus as the one who crushed Satan's head / Jesus will destroy Satan's power over the world through sin. 2. Jesus as the ark / those who turn to Jesus will be saved from the coming worldwide punishment for sin. 3. Jesus as the promised Son (like the promised son, Isaac), He died as a sacrifice for sin (like Isaac, who was to be sacrificed).

4. Jesus, like Joseph, brought salvation to the whole world. Today we will look at a picture of Christ in the second book of the Bible, Exodus: Jesus as the Passover lamb. Read Exodus 12:5-7, 12-13. Ask, what do we learn about the lamb from this story? (Answers: The sacrifice should be a year-old male lamb without defect (12:5); It should be slaughtered at twilight (12:6); Its blood should be put on the top and sides of the door (12:7); Judgement will pass over the homes of those with blood on the door (12:12-13)) To illustrate this story, tape three scraps of red paper to the top and two sides of the door. The blood from the top of the door probably dripped down, so tape a fourth piece of red paper to the floor under the middle of the door. There is another story that tells of the Israelites being saved from destruction. Read Numbers 21:5-9. How were people saved from death by the snakebite? (Answer: If those bitten by the snake looked at the snake on the pole, they would live (21:8,9). Our third passage does not speak of an image, but of a promise. God promised King David that he would have a descendant on the throne of the kingdom forever. Read 2 Samuel 7:12-13 and fill in the blank. (Answer: There would be a descendent of David as king forever.) We know that God always keeps His promises. This promise is called the "Davidic covenant". The fulfillment of this promise, as you read in The Story of Jesus Christ, sometimes hung in the balance.

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3. Look:

Now we will look at how these three stories from the Old Testament were realized by Jesus Christ in the New Testament. Read the New Testament verses in which Jesus is called the Lamb: 1 Peter 1:18-19; 1 Corinthians 5:7; John 1:29. Ask what the Passover lamb in the Old Testament and Jesus have in common. Have the group members fill in the blanks on the handout. (Answers: As the lamb was perfect, Jesus was the perfect Son of God; Jesus was killed on a cross on the Passover; The blood on the door was in the form of a cross - Show how if you connect the four red papers on the door, it forms a cross; When God sees Christ's blood, judgement will pass over.) The second picture is the Bronze Serpent on the pole. What do it and Jesus have in common? (Answers: Jesus was lifted up on the cross; Those who turn to Jesus will live because of His death). Interestingly, Jesus himself referred to this story when he predicted his death. Read John 3:14. Ask why the serpent was used as the image on the pole. The serpent is a metaphor for sin. Christ on the cross took away the sin of all men. The third point from the Old Testament is the promise to King David. How was this fulfilled in Jesus? Read the verses in the printouts: Matthew 1:1; Matthew 12:23: John 7:42. So how was this promise fulfilled in the life of Jesus?

Answers: Jesus was a descendent of <u>David</u>. The Bible lists two genealogies of Jesus, and according to both, Jesus is a descendant of King David. Many called Him the "Son of David" when they asked for help and when He entered Jerusalem shortly before His crucifixion. He was born in <u>Bethlehem</u> – the city of David; Jesus was born in Bethlehem, though His family was from another city. In the Bible Jesus is called the King of Kings.

4. Took:

"As we read the Old Testament, we see more and more imagery and prophecies about Jesus. These lessons are only a brief overview. There are many other verses in the Old Testament that point to Christ that we haven't even touched on. The image of the coming Messiah (that's the Hebrew word) or Christ (that's the Greek word) was becoming more and more clear in Old Testament times, and many faithful followers were waiting for the Messiah to appear. Next time we will have our last Old Testament lesson, and we will look at several prophecies about Jesus Christ. For the next lesson, read chapters 5 and 6 from "The Story of Jesus Christ" and, if you have time, read Isaiah 53 (a prophecy about Jesus), and Daniel 3 (an amazing appearance of Jesus). Memorize 1 Peter 1:18-19. Finish with prayer thanking God for Jesus Christ and His sacrifice for us.

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
